
You may lose your City Council voice through redistricting!



Summary

One City Council District is moving to the West Side - will it be our District 3?

Our Downtown and UNM area neighborhoods are a unique Community of Interest. We need a strong advocate for:

- Protection and revitalization of historic neighborhoods
- Attention to the urban infrastructure needs area this is the oldest infrastructure needs area in the City
- Metropolitan Redevelopment issues that need careful Council oversight, such as Downtown, the Rail Yards, and El Vado/BioPark

Redistricting Proposal Affects District 3

For the last 10 years, population growth on the West Side has occurred, requiring an existing Council district to move. It is being proposed that District 3 move to the West Side. If that happens, our representation be diluted on the City Council and our neighborhoods will be divided into surrounding districts.

This is not about me personally, although I have fought for our historic neighborhoods and am willing to continue to serve you if you will have me. It is also not about Democrats vs. Republicans. Our City fathers intended our government to be non-partisan.

How the Redistricting Proposal Affects You

Our adjoining city councilors can't properly represent their North Valley and Southeast Heights districts and also attend to the unique needs of our UNM and Downtown areas. Any odd numbered district can be vacated and relocated; why the push that it be ours? I suspect it may have just looked easy on a map due to its adjacency to the southwest area. History of Redistricting Changes

After the 2000 census, a centrally located Northeast Heights district was vacated and relocated to the West Side. The surrounding Northeast Heights council districts absorbed it without great effect. Its demographics and issues were not unique when compared to other Heights districts.
